Now, for all the bad press Windows XP got when it first came out, it is a major improvement over its predecessors. The majority of the bad press centered around the Beta version, and rumors about instability. Today, especially in light of the latest service pack, Windows XP has proven to be a stable, fast and fun new addition to the Microsoft family. What makes it so special, you ask? Read on.

It has better support for USB devices, which are rapidly taking over the peripheral market, and printers and scanners galore.

Due to its popularity, many, many programs were written for Windows 98, and that means that a lot of folks out there have older software that they have grown used to, and would like to keep. Microsoft knew this to be true, and built in a backwards compatibility feature in their new OS (operating system), allowing a lot of older software to work with Windows XP.

Windows XP also has a built in System Restore function, so you can literally go back to how things were the day before they went bad, something a lot of guys would like to be able to do with their wives or girlfriends, Ahem,

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There is a built in CD burning option, so that if your computer has a CD burner, you can back up your files with a few clicks of the mouse.

Windows XP also supports larger hard drives, allowing you to store more data and install bigger programs, as well as running on a more stable file format, known as NTFS. NTFS is like concrete compared with a bare dirt floor. Older versions of Microsoft Windows ran on a file format known as FAT, which stood for File Allocation Table, and ran fairly well using it. Windows XP offers greater stability under NTFS, and is much less likely to lose files or come up with file corruption the way its predecessors did.

An added bonus is that many digital cameras are recognized immediately when plugged in, and don't require the hard to install, often clumsy software that comes with them. I heavily recommend using the software already built into XP, especially if your camera comes with Kodak Easyshare, which I find to be one of the more troublesome, maintenance intensive versions out there.

All in all, as hard as it might be to admit, with active support and as many features as it has, Windows XP is shaping up to be the next most popular version to hit the market.

Study: Web Habits Vary By Gender

"Women are now as likely to use the Internet as men—about two-thirds of both genders—yet a new study shows that gaps remain in what each sex does online.

American men who go online are more likely than women to check the weather, the news, sports, political and financial information, the Pew Internet and American Life Project reported. They are also more likely to use the Internet to download music and software and to take a class.

Online women are bigger users of e-mail and they are also more likely to go online for religious information and support for health or personal problems. About two-thirds of the 6,403 adults surveyed by Pew during 2005 said they use the Internet. By gender, it was 68% of the male respondents, and 66% of the female participants. In 2002, by contrast, the gap was slightly larger: 61% vs. 57%.

The surveys find that for many activities, such as getting travel information or looking up a phone number, men and women are equally likely to use the Internet.

A survey from March found that 54% of online men use the Internet for job-related research, compared with 48% of female Internet users. A September survey found 94% of online women sending e-mail, compared with 88% for men. Women also were more likely to use e-mail to write friends and relatives about news, worries, advice and planning. They were also more likely to credit e-mail for improving relationships with friends, family and colleagues.

Men were more likely to participate in interest groups, such as fan clubs. They were more likely to use the Internet for entertainment, such as downloading songs and video, listening to music at Web sites and remixing songs, images or text into new creations.

Tracy Kennedy, a University of Toronto and Brock University lecturer who specializes in Internet use in the home, said that beyond gender, a person's offline life produces 'different expectations, different routines and different needs' when he or she goes online.

For example, women are often the primary caretakers in household so it's likely that she will be searching for health information for her kids and spouse (or) partner."

AARP Free Tax Service

AARP Tax-Aide will provide a **free** tax service from January 30 to April 13, at The Bella Vista Boys & Girls Club, 2260 Forest Hills Blvd., to **ALL** taxpayers with middle and low income, with special attention to those age 60 and older. Taxpayers do not need to be AARP members to use this service.

AARP Tax-Aide volunteers who are trained, tested and certified by the IRS will be available to assist taxpayers from 8:30 a.m. until noon, Mondays through Thursdays, except the week of March 20^{h.} Should Bentonville Schools be closed for inclement weather, the Tax-Aide site will also be closed.

Federal and Arkansas tax returns will be filed electronically. If taxes are owed on the Federal & Arkansas returns, they do not need to be mailed until April 17, 2006.

Taxpayers must bring their 2004 Federal and State tax returns, their Social Security cards, photo ID's, plus all information necessary to complete their 2005 tax returns. Tax returns with stock or bond sales, will not be prepared unless the taxpayer has his cost basis. Cost basis information should be obtained by the taxpayer, from his broker, prior to using this tax service.

Those taxpayers with private businesses, limited partnerships (K-1), rental properties or complex tax problems are advised to seek the services of professional tax preparers.

Due to recent tax legislation, taxpayers who will use mileage for deductions (business, medical, and Katrina charities), need to split mileage between pre-September 1st and September 1st to December 31.

This free service is administered by the AARP Foundation in cooperation with the IRS.

- Q: I get a lot of e-mail but don't always have the time to answer right away. Is there a way to flag it to keep it from getting buried in my other email?
- A: Click on the header for the message that you want to be reminded to answer to highlight the header. On the menu bar, click Message and select Watch Conversation.
