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Happy New Year! We want to start by bringing you up to date on what's new around your computer club. The Club now has a Programs Committee. At the February meeting we'll be demonstrating Skype, a free Internet telephone service. PC Tools has released a free malicious software detection program called, ThreatFire 3. Here is a short review by Neil J. Rubenking that appeared in the November 20, 2007 issue of *PC Magazine*.

PC Tools' ThreatFire 3 (TF3) detects malicious software entirely based on its behavior, so the utility can block threats that are too new for signature-based scanners. The software requires no configuration, making it a snap to use. Finally, unlike Symantec's Norton AntiBot (NAB), it's free.

If TF3 spots suspicious behavior, it enhances its analysis by referring to a database of known threats. The utility quarantines known high-risk items immediately and, for known lower-risk items, gives you the choice of actions. For unknowns, TF3 offers an informative yellow alert and asks permission to quarantine – almost always the right choice.

In my testing, the product successfully blocked installation of every malware sample in every category except rogue antispyware. Its overall success rate was significantly higher than NAB's and also higher than that of Spy Sweeper, our Editor's Choice for signature-based antispyware. And TF3 issued no false positives when I installed *PC Magazine* utilities that hook into the system deep enough to be suspicious.

The \$29.95-per-year Pro edition, however, failed dismally at cleaning up my infected system. On some, it couldn't even install, scan, or quarantine malware. But, definitely add the free utility to your security collection.
