Of all the pictures available over the Internet, 80 percent of these pictures are of naked women.


The 'Email' is older than the World Wide Web.

ENABLE OR DISABLE PASSWORD REVEAL OPTION IN WINDOWS 8


Windows 8 has a feature called password reveal option which has advantages as well as disadvantages.

The advantage is we can check whether we have entered the correct password or not just by clicking on the eye icon on the left of the password field. The disadvantage is others can easily see the password by clicking on the eye symbol which is a password reveal option. The password reveal option is shown in every password entry field as shown below.



We can Enable / Disable this feature in Windows 8


- 1. Open Run Prompt (Win + R)
- Type gpedit.msc Click "OK"
- Local Group Policy Editor will be opened.



#4 In Computer Configuration Expand Administrative Templates-> Windows Components-> Credential User Interface.



5. Open **Do Not Display the password reveal button** and click on **Enable Option**.


COOKIE

A cookie is a small file containing a string of characters that is sent to your computer when you visit a website. When you visit the website again, the cookie allows that site to recognize your browser. Cookies may store user preferences and other information. You can reset your browser to refuse all cookies or to indicate when a cookie is being sent. 
HOW TO CLEAR YOUR BROWSER'S COOKIES

Cookies contain information that websites have gathered about you and stored on your computer as small text files. Most of these files are completely harmless, but others store private details like where you went, what you did, and any personal information you gave. Websites may also allow other sites (their advertisers, for example) to store third-party cookies on your computer. To ensure that companies are not keeping tabs on what you do online, use one of the following methods to clear your browser's cookies or history.

CHROME ON DESKTOP: Open your browser and click the hamburger menu in the upper right corner. (Older versions of Chrome have a gear or wrench icon instead.)




Click "Tools"> "Clear Browsing Data" from the dropdown list



Select the **timeframe** you want to delete. If you want to erase all your cookies, select the beginning of time. Then check Cookies and other site and plug-in data. Check or uncheck other options as desired. Then click "Clear Browsing Data". Cookies, history, and other selected data are now cleared.

INTERNET EXPLORER 9, 10, AND 11



Under the General Tab, find the **Browsing** History section. From here, you can decide whether to delete some or all cookies. To delete all cookies, click *Delete*, select Delete cookies, and hit Yes. (continue on next page)


To selectively delete cookies, go to Settings. View Files. Select the cookies you wish to delete (hold down ^Ctrl while clicking to make multiple selections) and press Delete.

FIREFOX

Open the Firefox homepage and choose *Settings* from the menu. Then click on "Options"



Select the *Privacy* **tab.** Below the settings options, it says *You may want to clear your recent history or remove individual cookies.*



Select Remove individual cookies. To delete all cookies, click Remove All Cookies. The cookies will immediately be cleared. To delete specific cookies select the cookies you wish to delete. Hold down ^Ctr while clicking to make multiple selections and press Remove Cookies. You can even expand each site to delete specific cookies from each site.
