

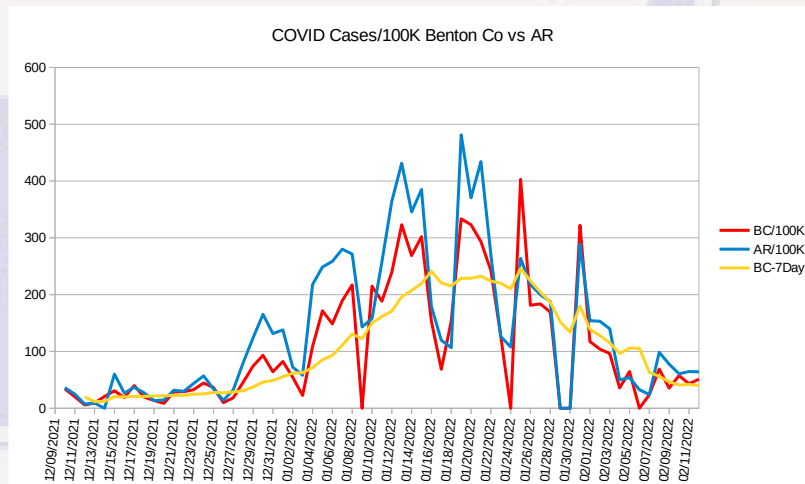

## Complete Robocall Defense

- Primarily deals with mobile phones. Two strategies:
  - Using contacts list as white list, letting others default to voice mail without ringing. Allows known callers through, others to leave voice mail until they are added to your contacts list.
  - Constructing a voice mail message starting with the "disconnected" SIT (Special Information Tone) to get robocallers to remove you from their list, followed by a "not really" voice message which robocallers won't understand. Be aware this could cause you to miss some auto-calls for appointment reminders or weather alerts; so use with caution, or try to get robocalls you want to receive switched to text messages.
- There are some strange black rectangular artifacts that show up at times on some of the slides
